Programme notes Lim Chae Hyun

UsTarbucksOWNd (2022):



During the composer's time studying at NUS, he spent quiet a lot of time at the Starbucks at the University Town (UTown). This Starbucks outlet used to be the largest Starbucks outlet in Singapore, meaning that there are a lot of seats and tables to study.

This Starbucks outlet is a representation of the bursting and energetic atmosphere of UTown. It carries daily lives of people who live and stay at UTown.

The piece, UsTarbucksOWNd, a combination of two words UTown and Starbucks, is a musical ethnography of the place. The trumpet narrates the flow of events in the Starbucks store. The playback is the rendered field recording at the store.

Please pay attention to how the trumpet's onomatopoeia corresponds to the sounds effects in the playback. It is also nice to imagine the landscape of the store as time passes in a day.

We prefer most of our surroundings to be consistent and har-



monious. We fix the inconsistent components to put them back to the state that is logical and sensible.

The theory of cognitive dissonance is based on the above assumption. People select, organize, and interpret sensory stimulation into 'meaningful' and 'coherent' manners. If people perceive two elements of knowledge that do not agree with each other, people will be psychologically uncomfortable.

Therefore, people are motivated to reduce dissonance and achieve consonance, and to avoid situations and information which would likely increase dissonance. This process of dissonance resolution can be applied to the music making, such as composers' approaches to reduce ambiguity of intentions, strive to coherently present materials, and to convey ideas in time-efficient manner.

A series of: Cognitively Satisfying Music is a digression from conventional cognitive process of music making. The piece are built on cognitively dissonant materials and organizations. The piece invites listeners to explore the different dimensions of dissonances in music making. The piece does not allow listeners to sit back, relax, and wait for the resolution of tensions.

About the composer:

Lim Chae Hyun (B.Mus4, Composition, CNM) is a composer who create works with extra-musical materials, such as artifacts, or communications theories. He musicalize things that aren't music. He turns concepts into sound. He translate visual art works into musical systems and transform societal affairs into sonic ones.

Chae Hyun studied composition with Peter Edwards and Chen Zhangyi during his studies at YST. His works has been performed by renowned ensembles such as Hand Werk and Ensemble Chromoson, and internationally-renowned artists including Martin Jaggi and Christoph Wichert.

- The mist tells you there is more.


II. Flowers on the Other Shore

Red spider lilies, also known as Higanbana and Manjusaka, carry meaning of passion, sad memory, separation and reincarnation. When the flowers bloom, the leaves would have fallen; when the leaves grow, the flowers would have wilted. According to Lotus Sutra, white Mandarava flowers descend from the heavens with the most fragrance. They turn red on the shores of hell, becoming the only flowers blooming on the other side of the river, guiding souls through samsara – the cycle of rebirth. The fragrance of these red flowers has magic to evoke memories from previous lives.



About the composer:

Tai Yun Ming (B.Mus4, composition) works with and takes inspiration from different disciplines in art such as film, visual art, dance, and painting. Her works were featured in Free Hand Piano Festival 2022, In Your Hands 2022 (a) Esplanade, Arts and Science Days 2020 (a) Saint Etienne, Hot Air Music Festival 2021, and Simpósio Internacional de Música Nova 2021. She has also won first prize in Chopin Society Malaysia's Virtual International Music Competition 2020 (composition) and collaborated with the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra (MPO).
