About The Performer

Programme Notes

FREDERIC CHOPIN (1810 - 1849)
Sonata in g minor for Cello and Piano, Op. 65
Composed between 1845 and 1846.

I. Allegro moderato

In the beginning, the piano plays big scale to begin a complex and prof ound story. The main theme is supported by piano's intense harmonical chords, which give a strong impression to the audience. The cello then take the same melody line by having passionate conversation with the p iano until a moment of calm passage comes. Also, Chopin had a habit of splitting melody lines in piano part which helped people to feel extre mely rich texture.

II. Scherzo: Allegro con brio

The second movement's energetic passage utilizes rhythmically articulated notes by leading audiences to feel hammering momentum. Scherzo part sounds like a dance music and in the cantabile trio section, the cello pla ys main melody very generously by arousing reminiscence characteristic of a folk song.

III. Largo

3rd movement is indeed the generous Largo. Both the cello and the pia no have beautiful singing lines, and the piano changes chords by leading the cello to create not only a peaceful moment but also a slightly differ ent atmosphere.

Finale: Allegro

The finale changes into a minor key, which makes main theme more complex and dramatic. Finale is consisted of lots of dotted rhythms, and when it repeated, audiences can feel joyful atmosphere through repeated notes. The main theme then reappears and leads cello to move into faster coda which is full of brilliant idea for both cello and piano.
